[Attention: New policy regarding student organization names](#)

We are in the process of implementing a new policy regarding the names of student organizations. For example, if right now your organization's name reads as the "Indiana University I Love Student Activities," you will want to transition the "Indiana University" to after the group's name. The new policy

states that the organization names should read "I love Student Activities at Indiana University" as organizations are "at IU" not "of IU". The policy is below.

I hope that this change will not be difficult for your organizations. Please feel sao@indiana.edu with any questions.

"Indiana University – Bloomington recognizes and supports the development of all student organizations. Student organizations are not departments or administrative units of Indiana University, and therefore we require all student groups who choose to use the Indiana University or IU name to clearly indicate in their organizational title, constitution, and paraphernalia that they are "at Indiana University."

The purpose of this distinction is to ensure that outside organizations that do interact with student organizations are aware that their dealings are with the club or group and not with the University itself. Student organizations may use Indiana University *before* the title or name of their group only if the organization receives money from the Committee for Fee Review, has been approved for listing on the Bursar's registration checklist, or upon approval by the Dean of Students."

****A representative from your organization must attend in order for your organization to be eligible to receive IUSA funds for the 2008-2009 school year.**

- Organizational resources in civic engagement, collaboration, diversity, & leadership

The Student Organization Orientation serves as an introduction to resources available to student organizations on campus. The Orientation will feature sessions on leadership, civic engagement, collaboration, and building inclusive organizations; how Student Activities can assist student organizations; the benefits of being a registered student organization; ways to fund events; and more. This event is ideal for the executive board of student organizations. At least TWO members of your organization should plan on attending this session. Mini-orientation sessions are held following the initial fall orientation.

The Indiana University Student Foundation (IUSF) and its parent organization, the Indiana University Foundation, would like to announce the Fall Metz Grant. The Metz Grant was instituted to award \$50,000 in grant money to registered student organizations around campus for a philanthropic cause. Each semester \$25,000 in grant money is given to campus organizations. Each organization can apply for up to \$5,000 in grant money and applicants are chosen by a committee made up of IUSF Steering Committee Members and Indiana University Foundation's Board of Associates.

Applications are available now on the Metz Grant website at, <http://iusf.indiana.edu/metz/>. There are five categories for which each applicant can register: Indiana University campus diversity, Local (Bloomington), State (Indiana), National, and International.

All applications are due Friday, October 17th, 2008 by 4pm at the Wilcox House, located at 1606 North Fee Lane.

This is the third year for the Metz Grant which is funded by the Arthur R. Metz Philanthropic Opportunity Fund and is administered through the Special Events committee. Arthur R. Metz, M.D., was a devoted IU alumnus and prominent philanthropist. The Metz Foundation was originally created by Dr. Metz in 1948 to help medical students. Current contributions to IU from the Metz Foundation include funds to the Department of Theatre and Drama, the Arthur R. Metz Distinguished Scholarships, the Wells Scholar Program professorship endowment, the Arthur R. Metz Medical Scholarship, and the Arthur R. Metz Carillon. The Metz Grant program is the newest addition to this long list of philanthropic works that can be attributed to Dr. Metz.

The mission of the IU Student Foundation is to create student leadership opportunities by conducting campus events that raise funding for working student scholarships; as well as guide the undergraduate student toward recognition and appreciation of his or her future role as a meaningful, supportive Indiana University alumnus.

U-495 Second 8 Week Classes

Fast Track to Leadership, Section #30829 1 Credit

Thursdays from 2-4 pm

Students will explore the history and tradition of student involvement, engagement, and leadership at IU. They will discuss trends and current issues that relate to the growth of the student organization community and out-of-the classroom experiences.

Introduction to Civic Engagement, Section #30294 1 Credit

Tuesdays from 1:15- 3 pm

Students will learn about Civic Engagement and its various manifestations in individual and public life. Participants will examine the rise of civic engagement efforts in the U.S and abroad, develop the skills to articulate personal experiences, and gain a better understanding of the role of civic engagement in their own lives.

Diversity Issues, Section #30294 1 Credit

Thursdays from 1:15- 3 pm

The goal of this course is to equip students with leadership skills and to develop individuals as inter-culturally competent leaders. Students will examine leadership within various social institutions and across cultural, structural, and individual levels of interaction. They will also study diversity's contributions to maintenance, change, and cohesiveness of communities and society-at-large.

Leadership Ethics, Section #30290 2 Credits

Tuesdays from 2- 4:45 pm

Students will explore leadership ethics. Through the development of a broad understanding of the theoretical, philosophical, and historical roots of ethics, students will critically analyze the ethical complexities of leadership and begin to develop their own statement of leadership ethics.

Leadership Essentials, Section #30290 2 Credits

Tuesdays from 3- 5:45 pm

This course will allow students to explore personal values and goals, learn about characteristics (inherited and acquired), recognize motivation sources, and survey a variety of leadership approaches/ styles. Participants will leave the course with a better understanding of self and how leadership fits into our daily lives.

Eyes Wide Open-The Cost of War to Indiana will be on display in Bloomington to commemorate the International Day of Peace. On September 24-27, the memorial to the Indiana soldiers killed in the Iraq war will be displayed on the Courthouse Square, Indiana University campus and in People’s Park on Kirkwood. The exhibit features 145 pairs of empty combat boots representing the Indiana servicemen and women who have lost their lives as a result of the Iraq war. 200 pairs of civilian shoes stand by the combat boots to represent just a portion of the estimated 1,000,000 + Iraqi civilian

casualties. Signage and banners that accompany the exhibit also discuss the economic cost of war. The exhibit was created by the American Friends Service Committee and will be displayed with cooperation from Bloomington Friends and other area peace groups.
